
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## EDCTP's Public project platform improved its search

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## Recent events

### **World Vaccine Congress Europe | Barcelona, Spain | 29-31/10 2019**

The 2019 World Vaccine Congress Europe took place in Barcelona from 29-31 October. Project Officer Dr Johanna Roth represented EDCTP and gave an oral presentation on capacity for vaccine trials in emerging countries from an EDCTP perspective. She also participated in a panel discussion on partnership models for international collaboration among vaccine manufacturers and governments.

Both the talk and the panel discussion were part of the partnership track of the conference, which is meant to bring together different collaborators in the vaccine field including funders, researchers, global SMEs, pharmaceutical partners.

### **EDCTP | Workshop on regional and gender disparities in EDCTP projects | 19-20/11 2019**

EDCTP organised a workshop on 'Enhancing networking among European and African scientists to close regional and gender disparities experienced in EDCTP1- and EDCTP2-funded health research capacity activities in sub-Saharan Africa. It was held in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia and hosted by Africa CDC, at the Africa Union Headquarters. Approximately 100 participants took part in the workshop.

EDCTP was represented by Dr Leonardo Simao (High Representative for Africa), Dr Thomas Nyirenda (Strategic Partnerships & Capacity Development Manager) Shingai Machingaidze and Michelle Nderu (Project Officers), Lara Pandya and Ana Lucia Weinberg (Strategic Partnership Officers).

The workshop is a follow-up to an analysis of successful applications for EDCTP funding. This revealed geographical and gender disparities in success rates, with the least number of applications being both received and funded from Central and West Africa. There are also countries in Eastern and Southern Africa with minimal participation (or no participation

yet) including Angola, Burundi, eSwatini (Swaziland), Lesotho, Mauritius and Madagascar, and Namibia. This is particularly visible within the EDCTP fellowship scheme that aims to facilitate career growth and development for Africa-based scientists.

### **European Union | MSCA seminar for African researchers |6-7/11 2019**

On 6 and 7 November a [seminar on Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions](#) took place in Addis Ababa in the context of the EU-Africa High Level Policy Dialogue on Research and Innovation.

EDCTP participate in this seminar. Project Officer Shingai Machingaidze represented EDCTP in a panel. Eight EDCTP fellows and four junior researchers from the EDCTP-funded networks of excellence attended.

### **EDCTP2 | Fin. and project management training | 19-20/11 and 21-22/11 2019**

Two more EDCTP financial and project management training sessions were held in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania (19-20 November 2019) and Johannesburg, South Africa (21-22 November 2019), respectively.

As usual, EDCTP Director of Finance and Administration, Abdoulie Barry, and the Director of International Cooperation Europe, Dr Ole Olesen, conducted this training for finance and project management staff of EDCTP-funded projects. The main objectives of these workshops are to help participants improve their understanding of:

- key financial management terms and principles
- the internal control and risk management implications of some of the decisions they take
- the importance of putting in place sound financial management systems

and to equip participants with skills and knowledge to effectively and efficiently manage collaborative projects with multiple international collaborators.





### **TESA II | Annual meeting 2019 | Windhoek, Namibia**

TESA II - the EDCTP-funded network of excellence '[Trials of Excellence in Southern Africa](#)' held its annual meeting in Windhoek, Namibia. The meeting took place at the University of Namibia, one of the partners in the network.

Trials of Excellence in Southern Africa (TESA) network was launched in 2009. At this stage, nine institutions from six different countries from Southern Africa were part of this consortium the aim of which was to create a framework for collaboration, capacity building and training among member institutions. Currently, TESA II, incorporating thirteen institutions from eight Southern African and four European countries, aims to strengthen clinical research capacities in Southern Africa, as well as to increase North-South and South- South networks among member institutions.

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## TREATS - spotlight on TB-HIV co-infection

The [TREATS consortium](#) held its 2nd annual meeting in Livingstone, Zambia on 8-10 October 2019. Its project - 'Tuberculosis Reduction through Expanded Anti-retroviral Treatment and Screening' - was developed to address the TB-HIV co-infection burden.

TB and HIV are the leading infectious causes of death worldwide - in 2018 1.5 million people died from TB. For people living with HIV, TB is the most significant co-infection; 40 percent of HIV deaths in 2017 were due to TB.

The TREATS clinical study is conducted in 14 communities in Zambia and South Africa and evaluates whether a 'universal test and treat' strategy is similarly successful in reducing the prevalence and incidence of TB. The approach was developed in the [PopART study](#) (Population Effects of Antiretroviral Therapy to Reduce HIV Transmission) in the same communities. The TREATS project also aims to raise awareness of TB and HIV through community engagement and linking anyone who tested positive for TB or HIV to immediate treatment.

The 2nd annual meeting of TREATS was attended by 45 investigators, including representatives from the Ministry of Health in Zambia, Department of Health in South Africa and WHO Global TB Programme. The investigators presented the completion of the TB prevalence study in 14 communities in Zambia and South Africa in young people aged 15-24.

Results showed that overall, tuberculosis infection was 44%, being 33.0% in Zambia and 62.4% in South Africa. Gender and HIV status were not associated with TB infection in either country. In Zambia, prevalent TB infection was associated with age and being a household contact. In contrast, in South Africa, prevalent TB infection was only associated with being a household contact. In conclusion, prevalence of TB infection in this young population was high. TB infection increased with being a household contact in both countries, and with age in Zambia. The consortium presented these findings at the 50th Union World Conference on Lung Health launches in India in October 2019.

The project is led and coordinated by Prof. Helen Ayles of the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine (London, UK) and [Zambart](#) (Lusaka, Zambia). It is conducted in collaboration with partners from France, Germany, Netherlands, South Africa, United Kingdom, and Zambia, including Imperial College London, Zambart, KNCV Tuberculosis Foundation, Sheffield University, the International Union Against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease (The Union), Health Systems Trust, Delft Imaging Systems and QIAGEN. Dr Montserrat Blázquez Domingo, EDCTP Senior project officer, took part in the meeting.

The total value of the TREATS project is EUR 26.3 million. EUR 12.9 million project is granted under the EDCTP2 programme which is supported by the European Union under Horizon 2020, its Framework Programme for Research and Innovation. The project is co-funded by Presidents Emergency Fund for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the National Institutes of Health (NIAID and NIMH), the International Initiative for Impact evaluation (3ie), the Evidence for HIV Prevention in Southern Africa, Department for International Development (UK) and the Swedish International Development Agency in collaboration, the Medical Research Council (UK), the company Qiagen GMBH, and the company Delft Imaging Systems BV.

### **STOP | Second consortium meeting, Ethiopia | 25-26/10 2019**

The STOP (Stopping Transmission Of intestinal Parasites) consortium held its second annual meeting in Ethiopia from 25-26 October 2019. See for [a short report here](#). STOP is an EDCTP-funded project that unites five European and three sub-Saharan institutions with one aim: "to find a more effective treatment against all species of intestinal worms, also called soil-transmitted helminths. The team proposes to add ivermectin to the current recommended treatment (albendazole monotherapy), and combine both drugs in a single tablet, suitable for all age groups (known as a fixed dose co-formulation)".

### **IGORCADIA | Capacity building in Liberia: final results | 25/11 2019**

On November 25th, Cristina Muñoz, project manager of [IGORCADIA](#), presented to ISGlobal students and researchers the key results and lessons of the project, aimed at strengthening capacities to diagnose infectious diseases in Liberia. The project, funded by EDCTP, was led by ISGlobal, an institution supported by "la Caixa", in collaboration with the Saint Joseph Catholic Hospital de Monrovia and the Fundación Juan Ciudad.
